Course Description: The goal of this presentation is to give teachers and administrators the tools to create a positive, proactive environment that supports the learning of all students. IDEA mandates that educators use positive behavioral strategies (PBS), when problems arise that interfere with student learning. The process of PBS is to create behavioral expectations and teach these expectations as well as develop consequences and incentives. The success of PBS can be assessed through qualitative and quantitative surveys and discipline data.
